
Dear Captain Boynton:






Dear Captain Boynton:





As reported on EnergyBulletin.net, the Chairman of Lloyd's of London Peter Levene, stated that "A terrorist attack on an LNG tanker "would have the force of a small nuclear explosion". he asserted that gas carriers make "obvious targets".






